THE GLOBAL HONEYBEE DISAPPEARANCE:

The Role of Honeybees (Apis mellifera) in Understanding the Toxicity of Sub-lethal Pesticide Exposure in Humans

By Professor Chensheng (Alex) Lu, PhD

Associate Professor of Environmental Exposure Biology, Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health



The disappearance of massive numbers of honeybees worldwide has raised the concern of losing the important pollinators and the implication on our food supplies. In this presentation, Professor Lu will discuss the onset of honeybee losses in 2006, the scientific evidence of its link to a popular group of insecticides, the global public policy implementation to address this ecological crisis, and its link to human health.

Professor Lu is an Ad hoc panel member, US EPA Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) Scientific Advisory Panel (2004-present); Associate editor, Journal of

Exposure Science and Environmental Epidemiology (2006-present); Associate editor, Environmental Health Perspectives (2008-present).

Professor Lu is collaborating extensively with scientists/researchers in several research projects including: 1) children's residential pesticide exposures with Boston Housing Authority and the Committee for Boston Public Housing, 2) dietary pesticide exposures with Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regional labs, 3) biomarkers of pesticide exposure and health effects with Agricultural Health Study, and 4) honeybee colonies collapsing disorder (CCD) with Harvard Center for the Environment.

The Dinner will be held at the Middlesex School in Concord on Thursday, June 15th. Beverages and appetizers will be offered at 6:30 pm, followed by a delicious buffet at 7:15 pm. Dinner is \$55/per person. Students \$25.

SCHOOLS AND SCHOLARSHIPS COMMITTEE REPORT:

Harvard College admitted 2,056 students to the Class of 2021, from yet another record applicant pool of 39,506, up slightly (just 1%) from last year. Of those admitted, 938 were admitted early (45.6%). This was Harvard's lowest ever admission rate, but just barely – it decreased very slightly to 5.2% (from 5.22% last year). Harvard again leads the Ivy League in its lowest acceptance rate, followed this year by second place Columbia (5.8%), Princeton (6.1%), and Yale (6.9%). MIT accepted 7.1%.

The admission rate for our Club's area was 6.1%. Of our towns' 132 applicants, 8 were admitted in total, including 5 who were admitted early-action.

In the U.S., international applications were expected to be down this year due to President Trump's controversial travel ban, but Dean of Admissions and Financial Aid William R. Fitzsimmons '67 did not see an impact at Harvard. International students comprise 11.4% of the admitted class.

Of the accepted students, nearly half, 49.2% (up from 48.4%), are women and 15.1% (up from 15%) are first-generation (the first person in their families to attend a four-year college). Of our Club's admitted students, half are women.
