SCHOOLS AND SCHOLARSHIPS REPORT:

Gabrielle Savage Dockterman, V.P. for Schools and Scholarships



For the fourth year in a row, over 34,000 students applied to Harvard. This year 2,023 students were offered admission, representing 5.9 percent of 34,295 applications. Admitted were record numbers of African-American (11.9%) and Latino students (13%). According to Dean Fitzsimmons, "Harvard's revolutionary financial aid program led a large number of our admitted students to apply. Many were surprised to learn that for 90 percent of American families it costs the same or less to come to Harvard compared with public universities."

In our area, Admissions accepted 12 applicants from 5 schools, and waitlisted 17 students. The class of '18 will also include 4 students previously accepted who took a gap year. Only 47 of our 55 active interviewers could participate this year because several had children applying.

April 18th we again held an ice cream social to welcome our local admitted students and their families to the Harvard community. Current students and alums were on hand to chat about life at Harvard. This gathering also provided an opportunity for local students to become acquainted before they revisit campus during "Visitas" in late April. Students have until May 1 to accept a place in the entering

class. Wait list decisions will be made by July 1st.



HOW VISUALIZATION, COMPUTATION, AND BIG DATA ARE CHANGING THE NATURE OF A HARVARD EDUCATION

Annual Dinner Presentation by *Professor Alyssa A. Goodman*, PhD'89 Professor of Astronomy at Harvard and a Research Associate of the Smithsonian Institution



Dr. Alyssa A. Goodman is Professor of Astronomy and a Research Associate of the Smithsonian Institution. She received her undergraduate degree in Physics from MIT in 1984 and a Ph.D. in Physics from Harvard in 1989. She held a President's Fellowship at the University of California at Berkeley from 1989-1992, after which she joined the Harvard faculty. In 1997 she received the Newton Lacy Pierce Prize from the American Astronomical Society for her work on interstellar matter. Promoted to full professor at Harvard in 1999, she was named a Fellow of the

American Association for the Advancement of Science in 2009. Professor Goodman recently served as Chair of the Astronomy Section of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and on the National Academy's Board on Research Data and Information. She has been Scholar-in-Residence at WGBH, is Founding Director of the Harvard Initiative in Innovative Computing, and is the recipient of numerous awards and honors including an Apple Science Innovator Award. She is a Microsoft Academic Partner. Prof. Goodman has been a Distinguished Lecturer at many U.S. colleges and universities and is the author of numerous journal articles and electronic media. Her research presently focuses primarily on new ways to visualize and analyze the tremendous data volumes created by large and/ or diverse astronomical surveys, like The COMPLETE Survey of Star-Forming Regions for which she served as principal investigator for eight years. At Harvard, Dr. Goodman teaches courses on astrophysics and on the display of data, including one called *The Art of Numbers*.

Professor Goodman will discuss how new multimedia interactive tools are being integrated into Astronomy curricula at all levels, from Kindergarten through Graduate School. She will explain how these tools are being used more broadly in the interpretation, annotation, visualization and analysis of data in areas ranging from rap music to medical imaging. Her presentation will include interactive demonstrations of WorldWide Telescope Universe Information System (see http://worldwidetelescope.org) as well as other data-visualization tools that she has helped to develop. She will conclude with a preview of a new edX (online) course on the evolution of "Prediction" from mysticism to math.

Partial proceeds from the dinner provide scholarship funds to help support students from our area. Beverages and appetizers will be offered at 6:30 pm, followed by a delicious buffet dinner at 7:15 pm. It promises to be an enjoyable evening, and we hope to see you there. Dinner is \$55/person, \$60/person at the door. Students \$25. preventable blindness and malnutrition. Nearly 40 million people are blind, and almost 2/3 of the world's blind are women and children. Malnutrition is implicated in the deaths of almost 8,000 children under five years of age every day.
