SCHOOLS AND SCHOLARSHIPS REPORT

Many thanks to our 40 interviewers who helped the Admissions committee select the class of 2019. Harvard College offered admission to 1,990 of its record 37,307 applicants. Competition for the coveted spots was fiercer than ever, with Harvard breaking its own record, accepting only 5.3% of applicants. Harvard again topped the Ivies

as the most competitive. It was surpassed only by Stanford, which topped all colleges at 5%, edging out Harvard for the second year in a row.

Fewer students applied from our area than in recent years. We had 94 applicants from 10 schools. Of those, 11 were offered admission, bringing our total to 12 (including one

previously admitted student who took a gap year).

It is a testament to the high quality of schools in our area that none of our 23 early applicants was rejected in the early round. Roughly 1/3 of these (8) were admitted early. The rest were deferred, considered later with the regular applicant pool. Ultimately, none of the deferred early applicants was admitted in the final round. Only 5 early applicants remain on the waitlist.

In total, 17 students from our area are on the waitlist. If any spots offered are not taken, waitlist decisions will start in May and be completed by the end of June.



LIFE IS A COMEBACK

Annual Dinner Presentation by Football Coach Tim Murphy

One of the game's finest teachers and motivators over the last quarter century, Tim Murphy is Harvard's all-time winningest coach, and since the formation of the Ivy League in 1956, only two Ivy coaches have compiled more wins than his 147. His Harvard teams have captured

eight Ivy League championships ('97,' 01, '04, '07, '08, '11, '13, '14) and have combined to own the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision's best record over the last 14 seasons (114-25, .820), as well as an astounding 13-1 over that stretch in The Game, the annual rivalry tilt between Harvard and Yale.

Murphy is the first Harvard coach since the iconic Percy Haughton to lead the Crimson to three unbeaten, untied seasons during his tenure ('01, '04, '14). Having previously coached five seasons at Cincinnati and two at Maine, Murphy owns career records of 179-107-1 overall, and is 147-62 with the Crimson.

HCC AT THE HASTY PUDDING


Oops Madrid It Again!—the Hasty Pudding's 167th production—was clever and

and connect before the show. Many thanks to Mandi Zaltas Kunen for coordinating this fun evening.


INTERVIEWING FOR HARVARD ADMISSIONS
